Session Descriptions

Please read through the seminar descriptions given below and decide which sessions you would like to attend. Some of the workshops are offered more than once. In this case, the same material will be covered in both workshops.

TEST TAKING STRATEGIES: During this session you will learn about how standardized tests like the SAT Reasoning, ACT and SAT Subjects are used in college admissions. You will be surprised to find out how the test writers put “traps” on these exams that make it difficult for you. Learn how to overcome the traps along with some really cool Princeton Review techniques and problem-solving tips that will raise your scores. It is a real eye-opener!

COLLEGE ADMISSIONS: This session will focus on the ins-and-outs of the admissions process. What does an admissions officer look for in an applicant? We will discuss the importance of all of the pieces of your application: standardized test scores, GPA, essay, recommendations, extracurricular activities and strength of curriculum. This is your opportunity to find out how these factors are weighted and what the process is like. What does Harvard look for? How about Stanford? The rules appear to be different for each university and we will discuss how you can maximize your chances of admission.

THE COLLEGE ADMISSION ESSAY: You spend four years on your GPA and several months on your test scores--how should you treat your essay (which is the third most important part of your application)? This workshop will focus on the types of essay questions colleges ask and what kinds of responses colleges are looking for. Also, learn about the do's and don'ts of the college admission essay. Some of the don'ts will surprise you!

FINANCIAL AID: When should you fill out the FAFSA? What scholarships, grants and other financial opportunities are out there? How will you pay for college? Attend this session to learn the various ways you may finance your student's higher education.

NCAA COLLEGE RECRUITING: Playing a sport at the college level is difficult. Not only must you be a skilled athlete, but you must also be a good student. We will give you guidance as to what to do first, and what you should be doing now to increase your chances for success. Learn about the NCAA and the Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse and get answers to questions such as: How can I become a recruited athlete? When do I take action? What are the differences among Division I, II and III? What is a blue chip athlete? When can a coach contact me? What forms do I have to fill out to be eligible?
