8. SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS/RECOGNITIONS

a. Association of California School Administrators (ACSA) Every Student Succeeding Nominee

Stephanie Fargo introduced Cruz Melendez, student at Trabuco Hills High School, who was an ACSA Every Student Succeeding Nominee. Cruz overcame physical and traumatic brain injuries as a result of being hit head on by a drunk driver in a traffic collision. a. Student Board Member and High School Representatives Report

Student Board Member Kaitlyn Heinecke and the High School Representatives reported on the activities of their adopted and home schools.

b. PTA Council Report - presented by Vanessa Tingey, SVPTA President

Catherine Beeny, incoming SVPTA President, provided a report. It was reported that there was a 137% increase in volunteer hours for a total of 102, 833 hours, which represents dedication and passion from all PTA members. Elections for SVPTA have been held and official duties of newly elected officers begins on July 1. SVPTA is proud to be part of the Strategic Arts planning process for SVUSD. SVPTA continues to plan and fund programs to bring the community together. The Fourth District PTA recently recognized Melinda Heights Elementary with the Fourth District Unit of the Year Award and Trabuco Hills High School teacher, Lisa Lotito-Byers with the Outstanding Teacher Award.

c. Saddleback Valley Educators Association Report - presented by Joyanne Goodfellow, SVEA President

Joyanne Goodfellow, SVEA President, provided a report. The Teachers of the Year were recently celebrated and SVEA has opened up scholarships. Planning has begun for the SVEA Retirement party. Michael Lee and Devon Tescher have been announced as WHO Award winners. This is a CTA award for union work. She spoke about some concerns and expressed appreciation for the work of SVEA members.

d. District English Learner Advisory Committee (DELAC) Report - presented by Mark Perez, Director, Language Acquisition, and Francisca Vasquez, DELAC President

Mark Perez and Francisca Vasquez provided a DELAC report. Ms. Vasquez introduced the DELAC Board. DELAC is formed to support multilingual learners and their families. All meetings have been conducted in a hybrid format, which has increased participation. SVUSD has approximately 4,100 multilingual learners. Four DELAC meetings were held throughout the year. The DELAC role is to advise the District in multiple areas, including the revised master plan and multilingual assessment survey. During the last DELAC meeting, input was provided for the LCAP. Families want students to achieve academic success and participate in all learning activities. Ms. Vasquez thanked the Board and Superintendent for making sure their students receive a good education. Highlights and photos from community and family engagement events to support multilingual families and students were provided.

e. Local Control and Accountability Plan Progress - presented by Liza Zielasko, Assistant Superintendent, Educational Services and Michael Gomez, Ed.D., District Coordinator, Assessment and Accountability

Liza Zielasko and Dr. Michael Gomez provided a Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) Progress report. Ms. Zielasko explained that the LCAP is a 3-year plan and SVUSD is currently in

year 2 of the plan. The process and timeline were reviewed. There were 22 focus groups that provided input over a 2-month period that began in January. This year's input from high schools was expanded to encompass more groups. The broad goals of Engagement, Pupil Outcomes and Conditions of Learning have not changed.

The results of the ThoughtExchange data were reviewed. The top seven thoughts received from the community wide survey were listed. Lowering class size and eliminating combination classes was a priority. The current class size reduction efforts were reviewed. Some of these efforts include increasing intervention teachers at the intermediate level to full time, 40% intervention teachers at the elementary level, and elimination of combination classes at Title I sites. Many of the thoughts from the community wide survey were mirrored by the LCAP Focus Groups. Among the input received was more instructional aides, more electives, accelerate learning of English and improvement of facilities. Following the report, input was provided by the Board.
